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Assyria and Israel

- 1. Assyria began long before Israel Genesis 2:14
- 2. "From 800-745 B.C., Assyria was torn with internal strife and by wars with revolting provinces" (Geike, *Hours with the Bible*, Vol. IV, pp. 183, 184).
- 3. This distraction allowed Israel and Judah opportunity to prosper and extend its own borders during the time of Jonah (II Kings 14:25-27).
- 4. Jonah rejoiced in Israel's temporary security but knew the Assyrian threat was looming. He did not want Assyria saved (Jonah 4:1, 2).
- 5. Assyria's subjugation of Israel and Judah began with the reign of Tiglath Pileser III 745-727 B.C.
- 6. 760-722 B.C. The prophets Hosea, Amos, Micah and Isaiah warn Israel of destruction from Assyria if they do not repent.
- 7. 725 B.C. Shalmaneser V besieges Samaria, Israel's capital city.
- 8. 722 B.C. Samaria falls to Assyrian ruler Sargon II.
- 9. 705 B.C. Sargon dies. His son Sennacherib reigns in his place. Judah and Egypt rebel and refuse to pay tribute.

- 10. 701 B.C. Sennacherib invades Judah. He destroys 46 Judean cities, many villages and enslaves 200,150 Judean people (II Kings 18).
- 11. II Kings 19, Hezekiah prays to God for deliverance. God answers His prayer and kills 185,000 Assyrian soldiers in one night.
- 12. Sennacherib returns home. Twenty years later he is assassinated by his own sons (II Kings 19:36, 37).
- 13. 663-612 B.C. The prophet Nahum declares Nineveh's destruction.
- 14. 612 B.C. Nineveh's fall. Nabopolassar of Babylon and Cyaxarxes of Media lead the conquest of Nineveh.
- 15. 610 B.C. The complete destruction of Assyria by Babylonians and Medes.

In Nahum we see the wrath and vengeance of God poured out upon a prideful and unrepentant people.

"Behold the goodness and severity of God" (Romans 11:22).



Lessons from Jonah

- 1. God is the true ruler of all men and nations Daniel 4:17.
- 2. God loves all men and wants them to be saved. He sternly rebukes an attitude of exclusiveness (Acts 10:34, 35).
- 3. Man cannot run from God (Proverbs 15:3).
- 4. We must put aside selfish interests and trust in the Lord.
- 5. Jesus used Jonah's resurrection from the belly of the great fish as a type of His own resurrection (Matthew 12:39, 40).
